I'm now just over six months into my internship with Manx Wildlife Trust, and I've had the opportunity to help out with a great variety of different jobs with the team; from measuring and mapping upland peat, to sea bird surveys, as well as writing various articles (and this newsletter!)



Along with the guidance of Andee Dubbledam, our Forestry Conservation Officer, I will be launching the Wilder Communities project in the coming weeks. It will encompass projects such as Manx Microforests, Pick Your Own Meadows, Towers, Parish Tree Maps, and Community road verges, with the overall goal of rewilding urban spaces. Though our nature reserves are important,

many of them are inaccessible for people living in towns or those without transport. We believe that access to nature is vital for everyone's wellbeing, so if all goes to plan, perhaps you will start to see some wilder spaces in your own communities. With only a couple of months left at MWT before I head to university. I'll miss working here, but will certainly be back to volunteer during school breaks. It's been an incredibly valuable experience for me and I've learnt more than I could have imagined.

Celebrating Our Volunteers

Midweek Muckers - Tricia Sayle

Since the ending of Lockdown 3, the Midweek Muckers have undertaken a variety of tasks across many of the reserves. Several tasks have involved the removal of Montbretia, a plant common in many gardens but highly invasive. It is a Schedule 8 species under the Wildlife Act, 1990 and as such it is an offence to release or allow it to escape into the wild.

Glen Dhoo has been the focus of Thursday tasks for a few weeks,



with fence repairs required and several minor tasks around the site. The trees and shrubs planted around the reserve over the years have been tended and are generally doing very well. Glen Dhoo is looking at its best now with a terrific show of pignut – well worth a visit.

Following on from the coppicing of hazel at Aust, we have experimented with the coppicing of some neglected

willow. There was sufficient material to make a couple of wattle which have been sold.



Last week, a small group helped me cut and clear the paths at Close Sartfield so visitors can enjoy the orchids. We held guided walks around the reserve Sunday 13th and Sunday 20th June. With birds nesting, and flowers coming into bloom, tasks will be intermittent throughout June.

Calf of Man

As I'm sure many of you are aware, we were thrilled to announce that two real puffins were spotted at Kione my Halby, on the Calf, with the decoys!

Keirron Tastagh from Adventurous Experiences spotted them while out kayaking and managed to get a photograph, This is the first photographed puffin sighting (that we know of) on The Calf since the puffin project started.



Later in the week, photographed by MWT Assistant Estate Warden, Rob Fisher, a puffin was seen carrying nesting materials. If you are lucky enough to see the puffins please share photographs and details on the MWT or Calf of Man facebook pages. However keep in mind that like all birds, they are susceptible to disturbance during the early stages of breeding so we ask everyone to give them space, avoid areas where the puffin decoys are and stick to the marked paths. For the best chance of success, please help to keep them safe!



Other than Puffin monitoring, the Calf Bird Team have been surveying breeding seabirds, specifically Flumer and Auks, as well as Shag monitoring and colour ringing. The Estate

team have been busy as ever with bracken cutting, bait monitoring, horsetail control and ongoing track repairs, as well as filming content for wildlife week.

Ballachurry Reserve - Sheila Norris

After a long winter of interruptions from bad weather, poor ground conditions, and lockdowns, it was wonderful to have our volunteers back at Ballachurry reserve for a Work Party in April.

Their primary mission was to spread wood chip along the paths which had been quagmires throughout the winter. Thanks rootstoshoots.im for their generous donation.

Due to the fantastic number of volunteers who showed up (18 and counting!) They were also able to start work on the hide, coating it with wood preservative and repairing window shutters, as well as cutting back overgrown brambles from the path.



Three new volunteers were a huge help on site; we'd like to extend a warm welcome to Chris, Catherine and Jarod, our Duke of Edinburgh Award student, all of whom we hope to see more of in the future.

Southern Group

The Southern Group had an extremely successful open gardens weekend this month and managed to raise £1137.44 for MWT! A huge thank you to everyone who gave their time to organise the event, and the garden owners who worked so hard to prepare their gardens for everyone to enjoy. 
Northern Group - Kim Etherton




Wildlife Gift Shop

Projects include surveying a salt marsh, Hedgehog monitoring, butterfly transects, invertebrate identification and upland peat surveying. The map below shows the upland peat area already surveyed, which is a fantastic achievement by our volunteers,


As always, thank you for your on-going support, the work of volunteers is crucial for MWT to operate at our best. With many exciting events coming up this summer, we hope to see you all there.
